K-6 Excursions




The community work together to achieve a climate of care and positivity.




The school environment fosters positive relationships and wellbeing.






Some identified improvement areas include:

Behaviour Code for Students

Melrose Park Public School is committed to providing a safe, supportive environment for all students. Through our Wellbeing programs and Positive Behaviour for Learning, we teach and model behaviours to ensure that students are consistently displaying respectful, responsible, learner expectations. We actively encourage students to report incidents to teachers to ensure all students are supported.

When students attend school, they are expected to follow the Behaviour Code for Students. I encourage you to read the Behaviour Code document at the end of the newsletter with your children and develop a shared understanding of behaviour expectations in NSW Public Schools.

Effective Practices

Assessment and Reporting

Tomorrow, formal written reports on students will be distributed to parents. Kindergarten will be provided with information on how well they are meeting learning outcomes) that is whether they are consistently achieving, working at or working towards learning outcomes).

For Years 1-6, the report follows a grading scale set out by the NSW Education Standards Authority and the Department of Education. The scale describes the depth of knowledge, skills and understanding that students working at that standard typically show.

Outstanding Achievement	The student has an extensive knowledge and understanding of the content and can readily apply this knowledge. In addition, the student has achieved a very high level of competence in the processes and skills and can apply these skills to new situations.
High Achievement	The student has a thorough knowledge and understanding of the content and a high level of competence in the processes and skills. In addition, the student is able to apply this knowledge and these skills to most situations.
Sound Achievement	The student has a sound knowledge and understanding of the main areas of content and has achieved an adequate level of competence in the processes and skills.
Basic Achievement	The student has a basic knowledge and understanding of the content and has achieved a basic level of competence in the processes and skills.
Limited Achievement	The student has an elementary knowledge and understanding in few areas of the content and has achieved very limited competence in some of the processes and skills

The overall achievement grade is based on a range of formal and informal assessment tasks undertaken over the course of a semester. An overall, balanced judgement is made to determine which achievement grade the evidence meets.

Congratulate your child on their achievements and discuss how they can work towards improvement.


LITERACY HINT:


Father Day at Melrose Park – Save the Dates

BEHAVIOUR CODE FOR STUDENTS

NSW public schools are committed to providing safe, supportive and responsive learning environments for everyone. We teach and model the behaviours we value in our students.

In NSW public schools students are expected to:

- Comply with the school's uniform policy or dress code
- Attend school every day (unless legally excused)
- Respect all property
- Not be violent or bring weapons, illegal drugs, alcohol or tobacco into our schools
- Not bully, harass, intimidate or discriminate against anyone in our schools

Schools take strong action in response to behaviour that is detrimental to self or others or to the achievement of high quality teaching and learning.

Behaviour Code for Students: Actions

Promoting the learning, wellbeing and safety of all students in NSW Public Schools is a high priority for the Department of Education and Communities.

We implement teaching and learning approaches to support the development of skills needed by students to meet our high standards for respectful, safe and engaged behaviour.

Respect

- Treat one another with dignity
- Speak and behave courteously
- Cooperate with others
- Develop positive and respectful relationships and think about the effect on relationships before acting
- Value the interests, ability and culture of others
- Dress appropriately by complying with the school uniform or dress code
- Take care with property

Safety

- Model and follow departmental, school and/or class codes of behaviour and conduct
- Negotiate and resolve conflict with empathy
- Take personal responsibility for behaviour and actions
- Care for self and others
- Avoid dangerous behavior and encourage others to avoid dangerous behaviour

Engagement

- Attend school every day (unless legally excused)
- Arrive at school and class on time
- Be prepared for every lesson
- Actively participate in learning
- Aspire and strive to achieve the highest standards of learning

The principal and school staff, using their professional judgment, are best placed to maintain discipline and provide safe, supportive and responsive learning environments. The department provides a policy framework and resources such as Legal Issues Bulletins, access to specialist advice, and professional learning to guide principals and their staff in exercising their professional judgment. In this context the NSW Government and the Department of Education and Communities will back the authority and judgment of principals and school staff at the local level.
